People4People Games to Raise \$100,000 for People's Community Clinic

July 31, 2000 - Austin, TX—On Sunday, October 15, thirty teams sponsored by local high-tech companies will compete in seven activities as part of the first People4People Games. The daylong event provides Austin companies with an opportunity to build corporate community spirit and help raise \$100,000 for People's Community Clinic (PCC). P4P gives us that opportunity as well as being a ton of fun to help raise money for such a worthwhile cause.”
